Scheduled Saturday, March 7, 2020

The Election Committee of the Peoria Tribe of Indians of Oklahoma announces the cancellation of the Annual Election scheduled for Saturday, March 7, 2020. The positions to be filled at this Election were Treasurer, First Councilman, and one (1) seat on the Grievance Committee

Hank Downum, incumbent, was the only candidate to file for the position of Treasurer. Carolyn Ritchey, incumbent, was the only candidate to file for the position of First Councilman. Mark Davey, incumbent, was the only position to file for one (1) seat on the Grievance Committee. All candidates were declared elected by the Election Committee. Each will serve a term of four (4) years.

According to the Election Ordinance: "In the event that only one candidate files for elective office, that candidate shall be declared elected. In the event a candidate is declared elected, it will not be necessary for the Peoria Tribe to conduct an election by ballot for that elective office. Furthermore, in the event a candidate is declared elected, the candidate shall assume office immediately in the case of a vacancy, or at the next annual Peoria Council meeting upon the expiration of an elected official's term."



The Peoria Tribal Burial Assistance Benefit is \$\frac{\$10,000 per member.}{\$10,000 per member.}\$ All Burial Assistance Applications must be completed and returned with an original certified death certificate no later than 180 days from the date of death. All deceased must be enrolled members of the Peoria Tribe. Payment will be made directly to the funeral home. Please visit with the funeral home concerning this policy. INDIAN HEALTH SERVICE WATER AND SEWER ASSISTANCE

The Indian Health Service, Miami Office of Environmental Health and Engineering, offers programs to install water and sewer facilities to qualified Indian Homeowners. Funding and construction of sanitation facilities, such as wells, water service lines, septic tanks and drain fields, wastewater lagoons and sewer service lines, are available.

Minimum eligibility requirements include:

- Property must be located within the boundaries of the nine tribes of the Inter-tribal Council, Inc. of Northeast Oklahoma in Ottawa and Delaware Counties, Oklahoma.
- You must be a member of a federally recognized Indian tribe, band or group.
- 3. The home must be Indian owned and occupied.
- 4. HUD homes must be paid in full before services can be provided.

Documentation of tribal affiliation and home ownership or long-term lease (5 years minimum) will be required with the application for services. Mobile homes must be tied down, skirted and wheels removed prior to service.

Please note that applying for service does not guarantee you will receive service. Service depends on the availability of funding.



Every Peoria college student is encouraged to apply. Financial need is not one of the criteria for the Peoria scholarship.

It is never too early to obtain a scholarship application. You may do so by contacting the Education Director, Lacie Hickey, at lhickey@peoriatribe.com, 1-918-540-2535, 1-800-259-9987 ext 10; or check it out on the Peoria Tribal website, www.peoriatribe.com.

<u>Application deadlines are July 31 for the Fall semester and January 7 for the Spring semester.</u>

Incomplete or postage due applications will not be considered. Students who accept scholarship funds but do not complete their obligation for that semester or maintain a 2.5 GPA forfeit their eligibility until they complete a semester on their own.

If you know a Peoria student who has received scholastic honors or other special recognition at his or her school, please let the Education Director know, so the student can be recognized in the newsletter!



Child Care Development Fund (CCDF) Program

The child care program is funded through the Administration for Children and Families (ACF). This program is to provide childcare services and activities. The qualifications for the program are:

- There will always be a co-pay per child per month for each family.
- Live within 100 miles of the Peoria Tribal Office in the states of Missouri, Kansas, Arkansas, or Oklahoma.
- There must be an individual that is a member of a federally recognized tribe residing in the household.
- Be under 13 years of age; or be under the age 19 and physically or mentally incapable of caring for themselves; or under court supervision.
- Reside with a family whose income does not exceed the maximum net income level, there will be some
 - deductions considered. Income level does not apply to the children that are physically or mentally incapable
 - of caring for themselves.
- Co-pay **example**: Monthly net income of \$4, 831 for a family of four, the co-pay would be \$80.00 per child per month. Every family will have a co-pay.
- Reside with a parent, parents or guardian who are gainfully employed or attending a job training or
 - educational program; or receive, or need to receive, protective services.
- Adult must be at work or in class in order for the CCDF Program to assist with child care.

April is Child Abuse Prevention Month Why is child abuse and neglect prevention important?

According to cdc.gov, child abuse and neglect and other adverse childhood experiences (or ACES) can have a huge impact on lifelong health and well-being issues if left untreated. ACES are traumatic events that occur in childhood:

experiencing violence or abuse emotional abuse by parent growing up with an alcohol and/or drug abuser in the home experiencing the incarceration of a parent living with a family member experiencing mental illness witnessing violence or abuse loss of a parent emotional neglect physical neglect

Studies show that people experiencing four or more of these events had:

increased risk for smoking, alcoholism and drug use increased risk for depression and suicide attempts poor self-rated health greater likelihood for sexually transmitted disease challenges with physical inactivity, and severe obesity

Additional findings show that an elevated ACE score can be associated with:

likelihood of attempted suicide across lifespan heart disease liver disease lung disease multiple types of cancer impaired job functioning homelessness criminal justice involvement

Tribal Member Reimbursement Program For School Supplies/School Clothes Program Description

Guidelines

- Student must be an enrolled member of the Peoria Tribe of Indians of Oklahoma.
- Must provide with application a copy of the student's tribal membership card.
- Student must be currently enrolled in grades K-12.
- Must provide original letter on official letterhead from school certifying the student's enrollment or current school year, or print off of the students current schedule or grades.
- Maximum amount is \$500 per school year.
- Must provide original receipts, <u>no copies will be accepted</u>. However, copies will be accepted on a case by case basis. Receipts submitted must be dated between <u>May 1, 2019-May 31, 2020</u> and show date and amount of transaction with description of item purchased.

Examples of costs allowable for reimbursement under this program include paper, pencils, notebooks, backpacks, shoes, clothes, school uniforms, lab fees, activity fees, summer school fees, or other fees charged by the school system. All costs must be itemized on a printed receipt and submitted with the Program Application.

All submitted receipts for the school year 2019-20 must be dated between May 1, 2019-May 31, 2020. Any receipts submitted not falling between these dates will be returned.

All applications for reimbursements must be submitted to the Education Director at the Peoria Tribal Office.

Only one application will be accepted per student per period. Each student can only be reimbursed 3 times per calendar year not to exceed the \$500 maximum.

Elder Care and Disability Reimbursement Program

Program Description

The Peoria Tribe of Indians of Oklahoma has established a program to aid the elderly population that could benefit from an additional funding source to supplement their households, and/or disability needs, without restricting or interfering with other government programs.

The Elder Care and Disability Reimbursement Program (ECDRP) will make available up to \$1000 per fiscal year (April 1st- March 31st) for eligible tribal members. Each eligible tribal member may only choose from one program to receive reimbursement, being limited to 3 requests for services per fiscal year, not to exceed maximum total of \$1000. All denied benefits will be reviewed by a 3 person Review Committee comprised of the Chief and 2 accounting staff members. Individuals will not be permitted to receive benefits as both "elderly" and "disabled." Applicants may only utilize one program.

Qualifications Criteria:

- Individual must be a <u>current enrolled living member</u> of the Peoria Tribe of Indians of Oklahoma, evidenced by Tribal Enrollment
 - Card to receive benefits.
- Eligible tribal member must be <u>65 years or older</u>, evidenced by a Photo I.D. to receive benefits.
- ♦ Eligible **adult** tribal member must provide an award letter or benefit statement from the Social Security Administration (dated within last 90 days), to receive disability benefits. **No other proof of disability will be accepted.**
- Minors or other disabled individuals already receiving Disability Social Security or SSI benefits payable to a representative payee,
 - will be eligible for tribal reimbursement program. All payments will be made to the **representative payee** as designated on SSI records. Minors not receiving SSI benefits must have documentation of state or federal Determination of Disability to receive reimbursement.

Eligibility for Reimbursement:

- An approved application <u>signed by applicant or legal representative</u> must be on file. A new application is to be submitted each
 - Fiscal year.
- Submission date of the application will be the date the application is received at the Tribal office.
- ORIGINAL RECEIPT(s) (not copies) must be sent to the tribal office, and be dated within the fiscal year of application date.
- All receipts must come from the vendor or service provider, contain the vendor's contact information, and a detailed summary of product(s) and services.
- Eligibility for both programs cease upon tribal members death.

FROM THE ENROLLMENT OFFICE

<u>Is your State Certified Birth Certificate on file in the Enrollment Office?</u>

The Enrollment Office is continuing to update all tribal membership files. Many members have already sent in their state certified birth certificates. To comply with Federal guidelines and be eligible for a CDIB card, issued through the BIA, a state certified birth certificate is required. Reminder; state certified birth certificates must show, state file number, state seal, state registrars signature and parentage. If you are unsure if you have a state birth certificate on file, please call the Enrollment Office. If you need assistance in acquiring one please contact the State Vital records Department in the State you were born and they will assist you in how you can acquire one.

Is your name updated in your membership file?

The Enrollment Office will be glad to assist any member who needs to have their name changed. If your name has changed please update your file to your current legal name. Please bring or send in your legal documentation (i.e. marriage license, court order), a current unexpired government issued photo ID and a signed, dated letter stating what your name was and declaring how you would like your name to appear on the tribal roll. Once you have declared your name it cannot be changed without legal documentation. Once received, the name change process can begin. If you are receiving the tribal newsletter with a previous name listed on the address label, please call the Enrollment Office for assistance or send your legal documentation (i.e. marriage license, court order) so the name change process can begin. It has been observed, the postal service has been returning newsletters and other miscellaneous correspondence sent from the Tribe if a persons name does not match their postal record. The process to update your name is not an immediate event. Please update your name before a need arises as the process takes the same amount of time whether there is a need or a want for a name change.

Enrollment Ordinance Reminders

The Enrollment Office receives calls with requests for help or general enrollment information. To help members, listed below are a few reminders of the Enrollment Ordinance, which was revised and approved March 23, 2002. Below are sections of the Enrollment Ordinance of which the questions or information are typically asked.

<u>Section 2</u>. Dual enrollment with another Federally recognized tribe is prohibited and such prohibition shall be strictly applied; an enrolled member of another tribe shall not be eligible for membership with the Peoria Tribe. If a member of another tribe wishes to become a member of the Peoria Tribe, they must first relinquish all membership with other Federally recognized tribes.

<u>Section 8</u>. Each enrollment application must be completed in its entirety and must contain sufficient information to determine the applicant's eligibility for enrollment. Applicants must list the following on enrollment applications: all names by which the applicant has been known, applicant's current mailing address, name and notarized affidavit confirming applicant is not enrolled with any other Federally recognized tribe, and signature of the applicant or signature of the person filing the application on behalf of the applicant.

<u>Section 9</u>. Applications for enrollment must be accompanied with a State certified birth certificate. Applications received without a State certified birth certificate will not be processed. The following must be visible on State certified birth certificates:

State Seal

State File number

State Registrar's signature

State certified birth certificates must also be recorded with the State Vital Records Division of the state of birth. The following documents <u>are not</u> acceptable when accompanied with enrollment applications:

Hospital birth certificates

Baptismal certificate (even when parents' names are shown)

Heirship records

County abstracts

Approval of birth certificates issued by foreign nations or other highest-ranking governmental subdivision with jurisdiction to issue birth certificates will be at the discretion of the Enrollment Committee.

Section 15. The tribal membership roll will be on file at the Peoria Tribal office. Any tribal member may visit the tribal office during regular office hours to examine the accuracy of specific roll data for him/herself. Roll data may be viewed for other tribal members only at the request of a parent regarding their minor dependent child's record. Under the Privacy Act 5 U.S.C., 552a, Section (b), release of record information regarding any tribal member who *is not a minor* is prohibited unless the tribal member provides prior written consent with a Privacy Act disclosure statement.

Section 18. Changes to active membership records, such as name changes due to marriage or divorce, must be made by legal documentation (i.e. marriage license, divorce decree, court order, etc.). Active members with change of addresses and other status information must notify the Enrollment Office at P.O. Box 1527, Miami, OK 74355 or by telephone at 918-540-2535 or 1-800-259-9987. Maintenance and accuracy of membership record data is the sole responsibility of each tribal member. Each tribal member is personally accountable for correct membership record information (i.e. contact information and/or name changes). The Tribal Enrollment Office will review changes to membership records to be forwarded to the Enrollment Committee; the Enrollment Committee shall certify its recommendation of approval to be approved by the Peoria Business Committee. Changes to membership records must ultimately be passed by resolution from the Business Committee and submitted to the Miami Area Agency, Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Missing or Change of Address

If you would like, you can send the change of address form to them for their completion and return or an individual can download the form from the Peoria Tribe website www.peoriatribe.com Go to Programs, then to Enrollment, under the Enrollment section there will be a change of address form highlighted in red, open the form, print the form out, have the individual (if over 18) or legal custodial parent (if under 18) to sign and return to the Enrollment Office.

The Enrollment Office has a new change of address form. Please dispose of any other change of address form you may have and replace with the current one. The new form has been placed in this newsletter.

From the Office of a Grant Writer

I want to thank all the Tribal citizens and their family members who took the time at this years' Children's Christmas party to fill out an income survey. I am pleased to report that of the 91 surveys that were handed out, 84 were returned. Of those 84 returned surveys around 75% of those are usable for data purposes. The ones that I had to cull out are ones that were not filled out properly; for example, several questions were left blank, or the entire survey was not filled out. As a reminder the Low-Moderate Income (LMI) survey is a necessity to prove economic and financial need for any future HUD grants. Once the data is gathered, calculations are made. For the calculations to provide the necessary information needed, we must have the number of people living in the household and the yearly income. The surveys must be completed in their entirety, and the incomes are listed, as that is one of the most important pieces of the survey, even if they are an estimate. These surveys are confidential. I am currently working with a professional on the surveys to make them as viable as possible. The amount of usable surveys we have is only a small percentage of what is required. I will be working on gathering surveys and compiling the data over the next several months.

Many of the funding mechanisms that the Tribe can apply for, especially for economic development projects, require our Tribe, as well as any other tribe applying, to prove a need. We must prove that there are enough "Low-Moderate-Income" people in our Tribe as well as our service area and that there is a need for the funding. One of the ways we can prove this is by using the U.S. Census. Unfortunately, in the past, not enough people in our area/Tribe have filled them out, or they were filled out incorrectly; therefore, past census data does not help us. The second way we can prove need is by conducting an independent survey. I am currently creating an anonymous survey to provide to Tribal citizens, as well as local community members; this survey will be very short and ask about household size, household income, race, age, etc. I will be at the Peoria Tribe Annual Meeting, and a few other locations on different dates to gather as many surveys as possible. It is vital to future funding that the Tribe gathers this data. We encourage all of you to fill out the 2020 U.S. Census and fill out the race question correctly.

2020 Census

How to fill out the race question correctly: If you self-identify as American Indian you should check the American Indian or Alaska Native race box. You should print the name of your enrolled or principal tribe in the write-in area. It is important when writing the name of the tribe that you put only the legal name as it is exactly. For instance, for the Peoria Tribe you would only write:

PEORIA TRIBE OF INDIANS OF OKLAHOMA.

Why is it so important: Every ten years, the United States counts everyone living in the country on April 1. Our tribes do not share enrollment numbers with the government, so all American Indians need to participate in the 2020 Census. The 2020 Census is an opportunity to provide a better future for our communities and future generations. By participating you help provide an accurate count of American Indians. Your responses can help shape how billions of dollars in federal funds are distributed each year for programs and grants in our communities. The 2020 Census is our count. Our responses matter. Regardless of age, nationality, ethnicity, or where you live, we all need to be counted.

Easy: In early 2020, every household in the United States will receive a notice to complete the census online, by phone, or by mail.

Safe: Your responses to the 2020 Census are confidential and protected by law. Personal information is never shared with any other government agencies or law enforcement, including federal, local and tribal authorities.

IMPORTANT: The federal government and local American Indian leaders and decision-makers will use 2020 Census data in a variety of ways that can benefit Native People and our communities.

The 2020 Census at a Glance

Counting everyone once, only once, and in the right place.

The U.S. Census Bureau is the federal government's largest statistical agency. We are dedicated to providing current facts and figures about America's people, places, and economy. Federal law protects the confidentiality of all individual responses the Census Bureau collects.

The U.S. Constitution requires that each decade we take a count or a census-of America's population.



The census provides vital information for you and your community.

- It determines how many representatives each state gets in Congress and is used to redraw district boundaries. Redistricting counts are sent to the states by March 31, 2021.
- Communities rely on census statistics to plan for a variety of resident needs including new roads, schools, and emergency services.
- Businesses use census data to determine where to open places to shop.

Each year, the federal government distributes more than \$675. billion to states and communities based on Census Bureau data.

In 2020, we will implement new technology to make it easier than ever to respond to the census. For the first time, you will be able to respond online, by phone, as well as by mail. We will use data that the public has already provided to reduce followup visits. And, we are building an accurate address list and automating our field operations—all while keeping your information confidential and safe.

Overview of Census Bureau Programs

CENSUSES

- The decennial census is the once-a-decade population and housing count of all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the Island Areas. The results of the census determine the number of seats for each state in the U.S. House of Representatives and are used to draw congressional and state legislative districts. Federal agencies use the results to distribute more than \$675 billion in federal funds each year.
- The economic census measures the nation's economy every five years, providing vital statistics for virtually every industry and geographic area in the country.
- The Census of Governments provides comprehensive data about the 90,000 state and local governments in the nation every five years.

SURVEYS

- The American Community Survey (ACS) is an ongoing national survey—sampling approximately 3.5 million addresses annually—that provides vital information about our nation's housing and people. The ACS is the only source of comparable, quality information about the people in all our communities. These data show what the U.S. population looks like and how it is changing. ACS data are used to assess the past and present and to plan for the future.
- Demographic surveys measure income, poverty, education, health insurance coverage, housing quality, crime victimization, computer usage, and many other subjects.
- Economic surveys are conducted monthly, quarterly, and yearly. They cover selected sectors of the nation's economy and supplement the economic census with more-frequent information about the dynamic economy. These surveys yield more than 400 annual economic reports, including principal economic indicators.
- Sponsored surveys are demographic and economic surveys that we conduct for other government agencies. They include the Current Population Survey, the National Health Interview Survey, and the National Survey of College Graduates.

Census History

Thomas Jefferson directed the first decennial census in 1790. As required by the U.S. Constitution, a census has been taken every 10 years thereafter. In 1840, the Census Act authorized the establishment of a centralized Census Office. In 1902, the Census Office became a permanent organization within the Department of the Interior. A year later, it was renamed the Bureau of the Census and moved to the new Department of Commerce and Labor.

She is thankful and honored for the opportunity presented to her by ITEP, to meet many wonderful people and to be apart of their education and introduction into the world of air quality.
